What are some things that make you proud to serve on the Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba Board of Directors?

Listening to some of the real life stories over the years and truly understanding how what we do makes a difference in the lives of so many students; working with such knowledgeable, hard-working and dedicated staff and board members who are committed to advocating for and improving outcomes for school meal programs in Manitoba.

Reflecting on the past 20 years, how has the support CNCM provides to schools changed?

Although only involved with CNCM for the past seven years, I think that year after year CNCM has strived to make improvements not only to the funding provided to schools, but to the nutrition support through school visits, workshops and continually improving how we interact with schools and help them to deliver cost effective and nutritionally sound meals. We've also worked hard to streamline our processes to make things as easy as possible for schools, while maintaining sound accountability for funding.

What makes the work of CNCM important, has this work become more or less important over the past 20 years?

I think the work on CNCM has become more critical during my years of involvement. Families are struggling more and more to cope with rising food costs and managing the complexities of raising a family in this day and age. The impact of social media has added yet another layer to family dynamics and not always in a positive way. Allowing children to have a safe place at school where they can have a few moments to enjoy some nutritious food, with staff and friends, goes an incredibly long way to reducing anxiety and allowing them an opportunity to learn.

What are some key accomplishments from this past year?

After several years of continually advocating with our provincial government for increased funds, we were very gratified to receive notice that CNCM will have its funding increased significantly starting in the 2022-23 school year. We also developed a clearly thought out board recruitment process and are excited for the next steps towards building our team of board members.

What are the key priorities for the year ahead?

Even though we were able to secure additional provincial funding, we must continue to work hard to maintain and increase support from both corporate and private donors. The need is increasing year by year and will not be diminishing any time soon. We believe an investment in a universal, cost-shared healthy School Food Program is important for Manitoba students, families, and communities and CNCM is excited to be part of that.

How do you see CNCM evolving over the next 20 years?

Although we currently support almost 300 school meal programs throughout the province, there are many more schools in Manitoba who also need support. I see that Manitoba is moving toward a universal nutrition program in all schools in Manitoba and firmly believe CNCM will not only be at the forefront but will help to lead the discussion and implementation.

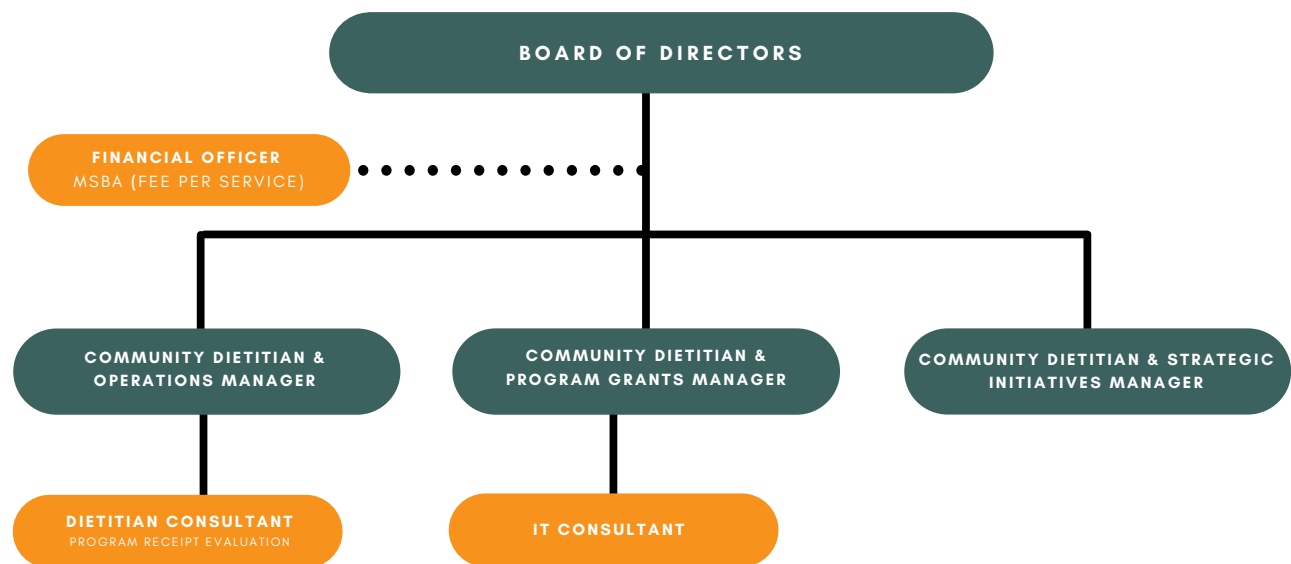

The Manitoba School Boards Association (MSBA) took a leadership role in starting discussions with interested organizations to address concerns about student equality and success at school.

The Manitoba Council on Child Nutrition (MCCN) was formed in response to that initial discussion. Representatives of various organizations and agencies, eager to find ways to support children's success at school through focussing on their nutrition needs, joined the Council to pursue that goal.

With assistance from a national organization, Breakfast for Learning, MCCN supported 8 school programs and 2 community programs in the first year with a few thousand dollars.

In 2001, MCCN had a large Board, one staff person and no provincial funding. In 2021 the now called Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba is a not-for-profit charitable organization with a small board, has a team of three full time dietitians, supports 300 schools, and receives ongoing provincial support.

In 2013, the support from the province of Manitoba expanded, allowing our organization to hire two Registered Dietitians to lead the nutrition support for programs.

Starting a strong tradition, the first Stone Soup awareness event was held at Manitoba Hydro Place in downtown Winnipeg.

With the goal of connecting with peers across Canada, CNCM was invited to become a founding member of Canadian Children and Youth Nutrition Program Partnership.



Program Highlight: Lavallee School

The Council has been proud to partner with Lavallee School for 20 years to provide students with access to food at school.

The program started by providing snacks to students on an as needed basis and has now grown into an essential component of the school environment that offers a variety of nutritious foods throughout the day, to nourish students' minds for learning. Fresh fruit, milk and cereals are available each and every day, with eggs, toast, smoothies and vegetables also available throughout the week.

To ensure that every child has access to food in the morning, the breakfast program begins at 8:30 am and runs until 10 am every day. This ensures, every child has access to the program regardless of what time they arrive at school.

In 2015, the CNCM long term Executive Director retired and transitioned to a Board position, while staff transitioned into a Shared Leadership Team to support the organization and school programs in Manitoba.

The Council became a member of the Coalition for Healthy School Food (CHSF), which includes over 200 non-profit member organizations from every province and territory. The CHSF is focused on the creation of a universal cost-shared school food program for Canada, that would see all K-12 students having daily access to healthy food at school.

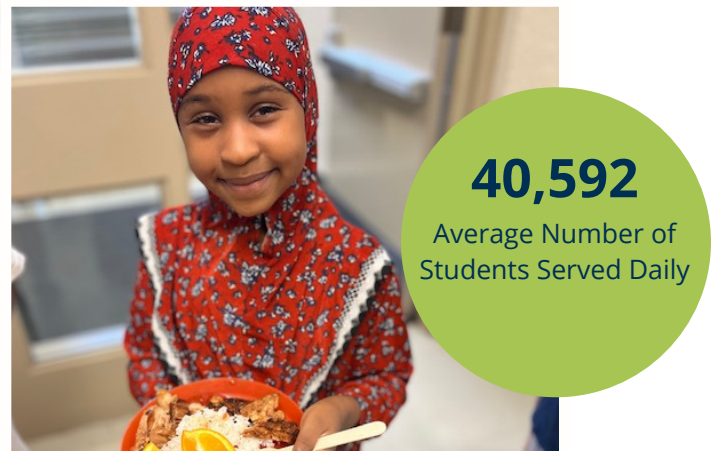
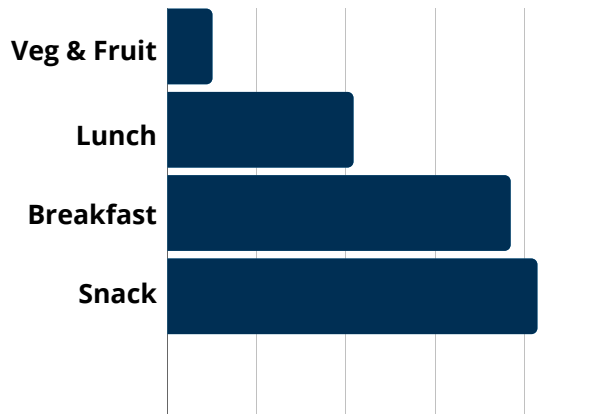
SCHOOL NUTRITION PROGRAMS

The Council is proud to be a partner of school meal and snack programs in Manitoba. Programs told us that in addition to funding and support from CNCM, they were able to leverage over **15,500 hours** of volunteer time, and over **\$230,000** of food & over **\$50,000** of supply and service donations.

TYPES OF PROGRAMS

Programs range in size from 6-1500 students and are structured to be very responsive to specific school community environments and therefore can be very different from school to school.

- **65%** offer more than one program type

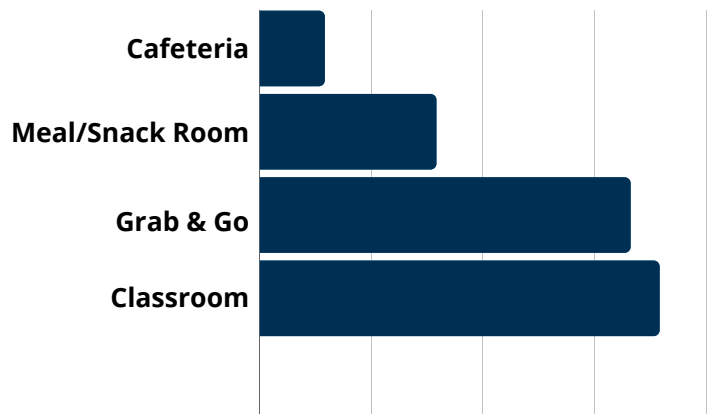


TYPES OF DELIVERY METHODS

They offer a variety of nutritious menu items that best suit their food preparation capacity.

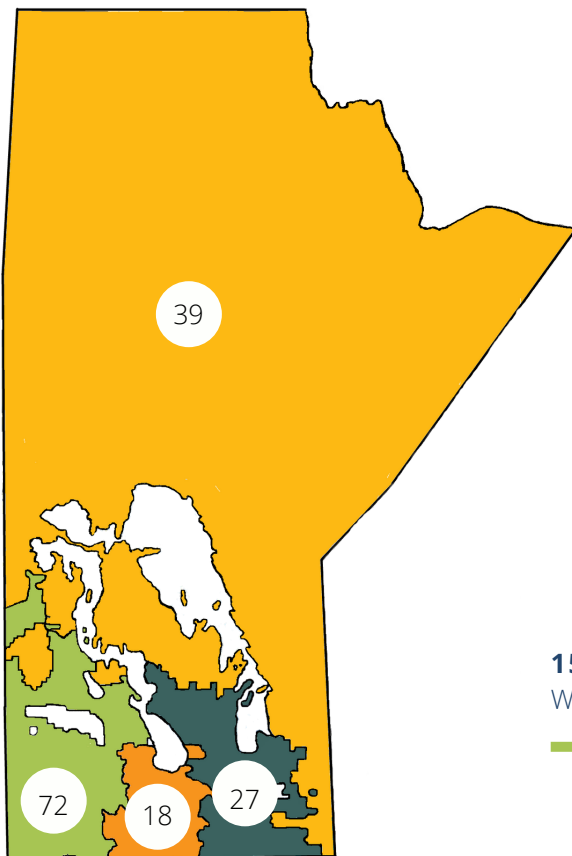
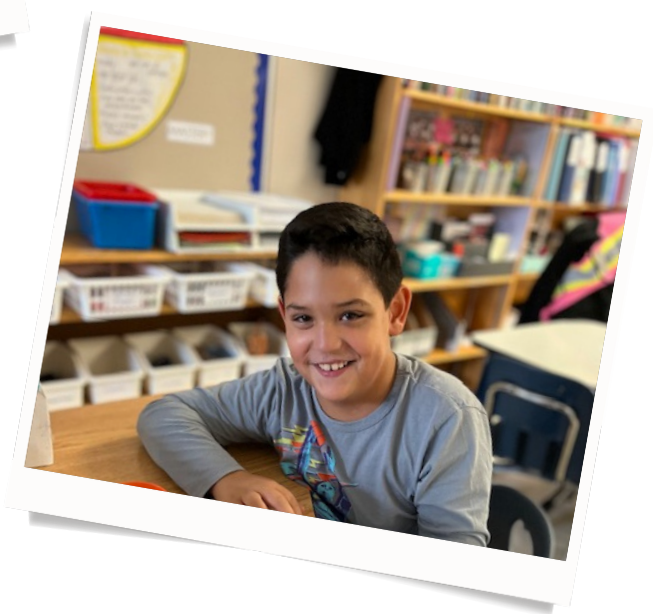
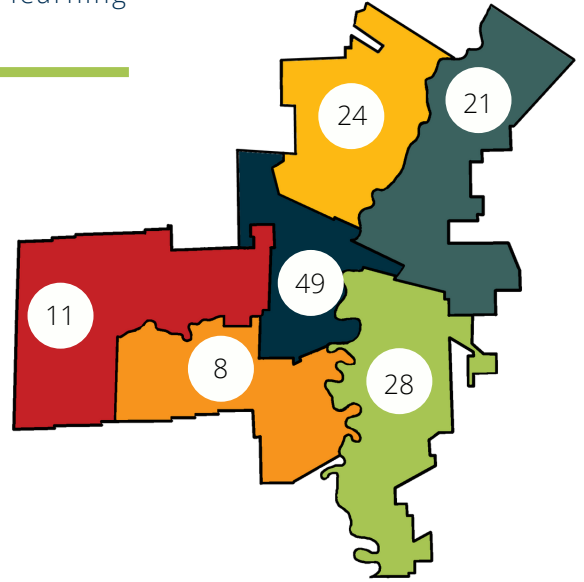

SCHOOL NUTRITION PROGRAMS

In 2021-22 the Council supported school meal and snack programs in every region of our province. Approximately half of the programs are in Winnipeg and half in all other regions of the province. We support programs as far north as Brochet and Churchill, as far west as Flin Flon and Roblin, Sprague to the south and Whitemouth to the east.

141 meal and snack programs and **5** summer academic learning programs in Winnipeg, reaching **21,263** students.



156 meal and snack programs outside of Winnipeg, reaching **19,329** students.

CONNECTING & LEARNING

The Registered Dietitians with the Council continue to work with school programs throughout the year to ensure staff and volunteers are supported in their efforts to nourish Manitoba students. Staff connected with schools throughout the year through virtual site visits, comprehensive receipt reviews, educational webinars and resource development.

VIRTUAL SITE VISITS

Our dietitians met with 122 schools over the phone and through video call to answer questions, help solve problems, and share new ideas and resources.

RECEIPT REVIEWS

We reviewed the purchases for 136 schools to create a report to inform food purchases for future years. Comments and suggestions based on the Manitoba School Nutrition guidelines and Canada's Food Guide were provided.

RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

A focus of resource development was the creation of a series of fact sheets for schools to highlight efficient and cost effective options for purchasing food in each region of the province.

As a new staff member taking on the organization of the grant for the first time the virtual meetings at the start of the year were incredibly helpful.

Hearing how other schools were implementing their programs and sharing ideas allowed me to have a better understanding of what could work and ways that I could bring new foods into the building to share with the students.

FINANCIAL

The Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba continues to make meal and snack program grants and nutrition support a priority of our work. All funds raised stay in Manitoba, reaching children in all regions of the province.

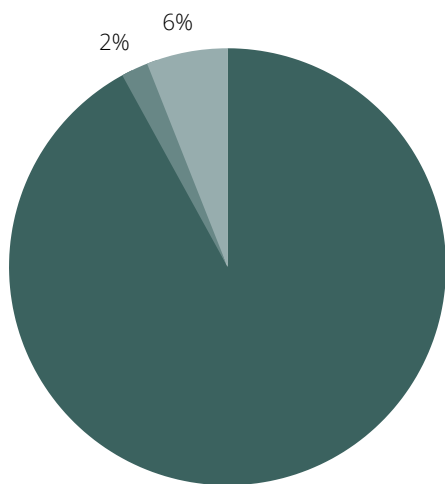
- In 2021-22, the Council was able to provide \$1,169,780 in grants to Manitoba schools. The applications that we received requested over \$2.5 million.
- The grants were able to cover approximately 10.65% of calculated food costs. The total calculated food costs were estimated to total \$9.8 million.
- With a \$200,000 contribution from the Province of Manitoba, 27 additional schools on our waitlist were supported. Schools continue to reach out to the Council, showing that the demand for support continues to grow in our province.

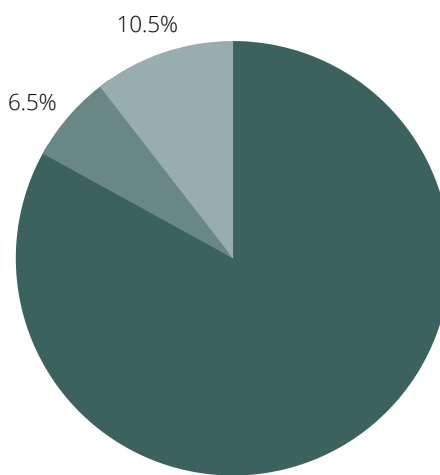
